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## What is an API?



An API is essentially an interface that can be used by a computer programme to retrieve or interact with another application. Many popular online services offer such interfaces, for example Twitter, Flickr and many Google services such as Google Maps and Google Book Search offer APIs which are used by a wide range of services.


Libraries have a long history of providing API access to their catalogues - in the form of z39.50, or more recently SRU/SRW. However access to other library information has been more difficult - who has heard of DAIA?

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"APIs are channels to new customers and markets: APIs used externally unlock the power of partners to use business assets to extend the reach of your products or services to customers and markets you may not easily reach."

Need to think about what type of activity you want to enable - that's why often the best starting point is thinking about what you'd like to be able to do yourselves

## APIs can...

- Enable new workflows
- Enable new functionality
- Allow others to build on your resources in new and interesting ways
- Make a 'contract' with developers:
  - this will work and continue to work

Unlike scraping HTML - APIs offer some amount of stability, and usually better structured data




Connected histories – combines data from a wide range of sources API architecture - aggregated search - but directed




University of Lincoln have invested in APIs for lots of different data sources - makes them agile and able to prototype and adapt quickly.




